Program Description

The Bachelor of Science in Therapeutic Health and Recreation prepares students for careers in healthcare, human services, and rehabilitation with a focus on improving quality of life through therapeutic practices. The program is designed to build foundational knowledge in health sciences, and develop critical skills in assessment, documentation, leadership, and evidence-based practices that promote the physical, cognitive, social, emotional, and spiritual well-being of individuals.

From assessment and treatment planning to implementation and evaluation within healthcare and community settings, students develop skills in activity analysis, adaptation techniques, and the use of assistive technology to facilitate purposeful and goal-oriented participation in activities of daily living. The program emphasizes inclusive, person-centered care for diverse populations across a range of settings including hospitals, rehabilitation centers, skilled nursing facilities, community organizations, corrections, and schools.

Students may also pursue specialized knowledge in the science of disability, therapeutic interventions, and program management to acquire the competencies necessary to become certified through the National Council for Therapeutic Recreation (NCTRC).

Note:

- Students graduating with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Therapeutic Health and Recreation will not be subject to the University's Foreign Language Graduation Requirement. Students who change their major may be subject to the University's Foreign Language Graduation Requirement.

Minimum Grade Requirement

Grade of "C-" or better is required in all courses applied to the major.

Additional Information

Credit by Examination: A student who seeks course credit by examination is to enroll in the course to be challenged. No course may be challenged after the first two weeks of the semester. The instructor of the course will conduct an assessment of the student's readiness to challenge the course for credit examination. Advising: It is necessary for students to work closely with an advisor to complete the BS in Therapeutic Health and Recreation in a timely manner. It is strongly recommended that students consult with an advisor prior to enrolling in courses, and this should occur at least once per semester.
